

Table Headings and Table Rows

The `<th> ... </th>` is used to label the rows and columns of a table.

This is an optional element.

In most browsers, the `<th>` element automatically centers the content of the element within the table's cell and makes the text bold.

The main body of a table is made up of rows and columns, like a grid.

In XHTML, you construct your table one row at a time.

Each row begins with a `<tr>` (table row) tag and ends with a `</tr>` closing tag.

Each column within that row contains the `<td>` and `</td>` (table data) tags.

An example

<tr>
  <th> Heading 1 </th>
  <th> Heading 2 </th>
  <th> Heading 3 </th>
</tr>
<tr>
  <td> stuff goes here </td>
  <td> stuff 2 goes here </td>
  <td> stuff 3 goes here </td>
</tr>
</table>
```
